I recently invited a former senior Ofsted inspector to visit St Edward's in order to evaluate our school. It has been two years since our last inspection, and I feel that it is good from time to time to get a fresh perspective on our work as a school, so that we can be sure that we are going in the right direction. His report begins; "The school exudes a welcome and a warmth. Leaders pride themselves that this is in the school's DNA, and they are right to do so. Pupils in all year groups feel cared for and at home. They are proud of their school". I don't think that I could have hoped for a more positive impression to have been given to someone visiting us for the first time. He made various useful observations that we will reflect on in order to improve all that we offer to our students, our staff, and our families.

'Welcome and warmth' is often difficult to find in the world around us. Our daily news is full of conflicts, the plight of refugees, division and social fragmentation caused by the use of social media to distort and manipulate, and the impact of environmental damage. In the middle of such global challenges we are trying to raise the young, and to equip them to try and do better than we have done to build a more peaceful and secure future for all on our planet.

Sometimes as places of education it is tempting for schools to look merely at examination outcomes and university destinations as indicators that they are effective. However when we look more closely at the needs of society we see the deeper yearning for something simpler and more fundamental if we are to have any hope of global



prosperity. St Edward's feels impelled to offer something greater to the future than just exam outcomes, important though they are. It is the formation of the human person, as an individual of welcome and warmth, confident in their uniqueness and aware of their gifts, attentive to the spiritual, compassionate and generous, that schools need to prioritise above all else. It is truly in the St Edward's DNA. For in this way we serve the future, of individuals and of society.

As Mary and Joseph travelled in search of welcome and warmth at Christmas, the St Edward's school community wishes you also, hope, happiness, and light. We look forward to seeing you in the New Year.

Britain's first astronaut Helen Sharman visits St Edward's

Helen Sharman, Britain's first astronaut, visited St Edward's School in October, sharing her inspirational story with students.

The chemist and President of the Institute of Science and Technology spent the day here on Tuesday October 15th, meeting students in her capacity as UK Outreach Ambassador for Imperial College, London.

Dr Sharman made history in 1991 when she launched into space for an eight-day mission orbiting the Earth, most of it spent on the Soviet Union's Mir space station. She was selected from 13,000 applicants, after responding to a radio advertisement asking for applicants to be the first British space explorer. She was also the first Western European woman and first privately funded woman in space, as well as the first woman to visit the Mir space station.

During her visit to St Edward's, Dr Sharman gave presentations to students in Years 11, 12 and 13, talking about STEM careers and further education opportunities, as well as sharing her experiences of becoming an astronaut.

Dr Sharman ended the day being interviewed by sixth form students Magnus Hinves and Grace Legg, answering questions about her preparations and journey into space, being thrust into the media spotlight, her views on space tourism, and about the importance of STEM in informing public debate.

St Edward's Science Teacher James Hall, who arranged the visit, said:

"It was an honour to welcome Helen Sharman to St Edward's School. She is a pioneer, a role model, and a brilliant speaker. Our students were captivated by her story, from her school days in Sheffield, to becoming a chemist and a career in chemical research, to her remarkable selection from 13,000 applicants to travel into space.

"Her life and experiences offered an inspirational



lesson in the importance of seizing opportunities when they come your way, as well as showcasing the wonderful opportunities that studying STEM subjects can afford. Helen made a huge impact on our students - they will remember her visit for many years to come."

Among Helen's key messages was the important role that STEM disciplines play in the modern world and the need for young people to have a core level of understanding, whether or not they pursue a career in this field.

Added Helen Sharman:

"I have had a super experience meeting the students. This is a really friendly school, and it has been lovely to see how focused the students are, and how interested they are in their futures. That future is so exciting when you think about the changes that are happening and how technology is opening up so many opportunities for young people."

She also offered some tips for any students wishing to follow in her footsteps. *"Being fit and healthy, manually dexterous, being a team player and doing STEM subjects,"* she added: *"All of that will do you good in all sorts of different areas of life."*

Sixth former Magnus Hinves, one of the two students who interviewed Helen Sharman, said:

"To be able to meet an astronaut and to hear about Helen's experiences - how it felt to prepare for the trip and the experience of being up there in space, was really memorable."



St Edward's Sixth Form

This term, Mr Matthew Lenarduzzi, previously Head of Languages for the last 12 of his 17 years at St Edward's so far, has now taken on the role of Head of Sixth Form, leading the ongoing development of this key part of the school's provision.



St Edward's Sixth Form currently has 175 students across years 12 and 13 with the vast majority of pupils progressing up through the school's secondary offering and increasing numbers joining at sixth form from other local schools. Students can now choose from 26 A-level courses, with recent new additions including engineering, sociology and human biology, and plans to further expand the range of courses on offer. Mr Lenarduzzi said:

"St Edward's is an incredible school, and the sixth form represents the pinnacle of what we offer, so it is a huge privilege to take on this role. I am excited to help develop the school's vision to take our sixth form provision to the next level as we set a course for our future as a school.

"Our curriculum is always under review, and we will continue to expand and improve what is on offer, listening to our students, and prospective students, about the courses that they need for their futures.

"Ultimately we want to ensure students leave us not only with the qualifications they need, but

also as well-rounded, engaging, articulate young people who can go on to lead happy, fulfilling lives – that is the clearest marker of our success."

Sixth Form students are now benefitting from improvement works which took place over the summer, including the refurbishment of the sixth form area, creating a university-style study room equipped with three glassed-walled conference rooms for collaborative work, and workstations for the PCs and laptops computers available to sixth form students. The revamped common room now has café style seating, sofas and breakfast bar areas equipped with USB charging points. Executive Headteacher at St Edward's School, Mr Michael Antram, said:

"This is an incredibly exciting time here at St Edward's – for our sixth form in particular, as we look to the future, always seeking to improve school life for our students and staff.

"I am thrilled to have Matt at the helm. He has been a highly valued member of the team for almost two decades and he will be a fantastic Head of Sixth Form, taking this key part of our school forward for the benefit of our most senior students and our whole school community."

Zac, a student in Year 12, said:

"I chose St Edward's because it has a great and diverse subject offering and because the school's ethos puts the student first. The relationships with teachers are really strong. You get to know your teachers well and they are really supportive - they really want to help you. And the new facilities are beautifully designed for working and socialising."



Key Stage 3

This Autumn Term, students across KS3 have engaged with captivating novels that have encouraged critical thinking, creativity and empathy.

Year 7 have been studying the text 'Private Peaceful' by Michael Morpurgo, a novel based on World War 1. This powerful novel has allowed students to reflect on themes of family and the impact of war, while also developing their analytical and creative writing skills. Alongside this, Year 7 have engaged with a range of war poetry and have approached poetry in creative ways such as performance poetry and blackout poetry to mark Remembrance Day. Well done to all Year 7s for a fantastic first term at St Edward's in English!

In Year 8, students have been studying the novel 'Boy 87' by Ele Fountain. This explores the journey of a young refugee, Shif, as he faces difficult obstacles. His story teaches us about displacement, resilience, kindness and humanity. We have been so impressed at the mature and thoughtful responses Year 8 have had in response to this text, this novel has sparked meaningful conversations about global challenges that help to foster students as engaged citizens. If your child has enjoyed this novel, Ele Fountain often writes thought provoking children's books- 'Melt' would be a fantastic one to read next!

Year 9 have engaged with the gothic text, 'The Woman in Black' by Susan Hill. This eerie and atmospheric book has enabled students to analyse the impact of tension, suspense and language on the reader. Students have also engaged with writing skills and have been crafting their own gothic stories using the devices and methods of gothic literature.

Well done to KS3 students who are excelling in terms of Sparx Reader. We have more Gold Readers than ever before! Congratulations to all who have received their Gold Reader badges this term. Thank you also to parents and carers who

have supported our students throughout this term! Your engagement and encouragement is so important in fostering our positive and nurturing learning environment at St Edward's.

Key Stage 4

This term has seen Year 11 complete their mock exams in English; students have had valuable insight into the requirements of their English exams and had the opportunity to reflect on their successes and areas for development in these exams in their ensuing lessons. So many students have shown an admirable commitment to their success in English, attending our after-school revision sessions and showing the evidence of their independent work in the calibre of their answers. We will progress towards Christmas by completing the Literature course content on poetry, looking forward to honing their exam practice as we proceed into next term.

Year 10 have, befittingly for the time of year, begun their work on 'A Christmas Carol'. Their reading of the text has enabled productive and thoughtful conversations on the characters, themes and context of the text, facilitating considered discussions on poverty, the virtues of charity and generosity, the ability for people to address their shortcomings and grow positively into the best versions of themselves and the meaningfulness of the upcoming festive season.

Those students from both year groups who are attending are also looking forward to the performance of 'An Inspector Calls' in January. An exciting opportunity to experience live theatre, the show will also further develop their familiarity with and understanding of a core GCSE text.

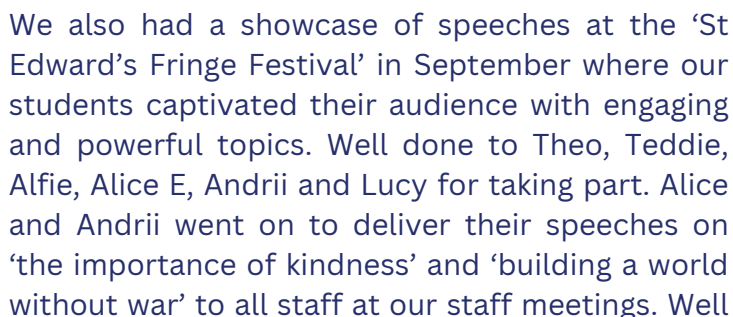

As we wrap up another bustling and productive term, we take a moment to reflect on the successes of the past months and eagerly anticipate the opportunities the new year will bring.

First and foremost, we celebrate the hard work and determination of our Year 11 and Year 13 students, who have successfully completed their Winter Mock Exams. Their dedication has been inspiring, and their achievements set a fantastic example for others. Meanwhile, our KS3 students are in the midst of their end-of-term assessments. This term, our department has focused on providing tailored support for our students. A Level support sessions, held every Tuesday after school, have offered an excellent opportunity for consolidation and deeper understanding of advanced topics. In preparation for mocks, we also ran four weeks of Year 11 after-school revision sessions, which were met with outstanding attendance and enthusiasm. We are excited to resume these sessions in the new year as students gear up for their final exams.

For Year 11 students exploring their next steps, we hosted Core Maths and A Level Maths taster sessions. These interactive experiences allowed students to gain valuable insights into post-GCSE pathways, sparking interest in how Mathematics can shape their future studies and careers.

The term has also been marked by outstanding individual achievements. Our Year 12 Mathematics and Year 13 Further Mathematics students excelled in the Senior Mathematical Challenge, earning several Silver and Bronze Awards. Special recognition goes to Kieran Bachmann, who was awarded Best in School—a remarkable accomplishment that he should be very proud of. Looking ahead, we are delighted that a number of Year 11 students will participate in the Intermediate Maths Challenge on 29th January

2025, and we eagerly anticipate their results.



Another standout moment was the AMSP Maths Enrichment Morning, where a select group of Year 10 girls joined 140 peers from across the region for an inspiring event. Highlights included an engaging talk by Ben Sparks on The Creation of Number, insights into post-16 Maths pathways, and an exciting team quiz. It was a day filled with inspiration and enjoyment, showcasing the richness of Mathematics beyond the classroom.

This term also saw a new addition to our team, as we warmly welcomed Mr. Williams. An experienced Maths teacher, he has already made a positive impact on our department, and we are excited about the expertise and enthusiasm he brings.

As we approach the festive season, we extend our warmest wishes for a Merry Christmas and a restful winter break to all our students, families, and staff. Thank you for your continued support throughout this term. We look forward to welcoming everyone back in the new year, ready to embrace further learning, growth, and success in Mathematics.



In Science this term our new Year 7 students have been acquiring the skills for safe and effective practical work and learning how to conduct a scientific investigation.

This involves learning the basics such as the common hazards and risks in a lab, using Bunsen burners safely, as well as what variables are, how to control them, the best way to collect scientific data and analyse it to draw reliable conclusions. They will now be putting their new-found skills into practice by working towards their Science Proficiency, where they use these techniques in their lessons to earn their Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards throughout Key Stage 3. To assist in this process, we have our newly recruited Science Mentors; a group of Sixth Form science role models who have offered to lend their skills and expertise to enhance the science capital of the youngest students new to the school.

Mrs Power's Year 7 classes have explored the fascinating world of cell biology by creating 3D models of plant and animal cells using recyclable and craft materials. They used items like cardboard, paper, plastic bottles, glitter, pom-poms, and toothpicks to represent the organelles, showcasing their resourcefulness and understanding of cell structures. This hands-on activity not only reinforced their knowledge of cell components but also emphasized the importance of sustainability. The exciting, colourful models were a testament to the students' imagination and creativity.



Many Year 8 classes have been getting stuck into some hands-on chemistry in the acids and alkalis topic. They have learned how to make their own



indicator at home using red cabbage, which can then be used to test the pH of various household liquids. Others have been making their own beautiful blue copper sulphate crystals by heating sulphuric acid, adding copper oxide and then filtering out the excess. They then gently heated the mixture using a water bath to evaporate any water to leave the crystals behind. One of my personal favourite practicals!

Since the beginning of October, some of our Year 9 students have been working collaboratively with Kate Salter of SusTrans, a charity making it easier for people to walk and cycle. They aim to connect people and places, create liveable neighbourhoods, transform the school run and deliver a happier, healthier commute. The students involved are working towards an accredited Crest Award research project assessing the air quality around the school site. This involved the positioning of some diffusion tubes to measure particulates that have now been sent to a laboratory for analysis and conducted a pollution indicator species study on lichens. Combined with the data from a new data logger positioned on Dale Valley Road to support their cause, they hope to provide some evidence and recommendations to students and their families about how to improve the pollution levels and hopefully reduce the risk of some of the associated health concerns.





Our GCSE and A-Level students have been heavily involved in enquiry-based learning, through the required practical activities that feature frequently throughout their courses. They also have worked tirelessly to achieve highly in their recent mock exams for which all students deserve praise for such diligence in preparing so well for these.

Back in October, Mr. Hall and Mrs. Horman arranged a visit from Dr. Helen Sharman, the first British astronaut who took part in Project Juno on the Russian Space Station Mir in 1991. She delivered some very sound advice on futures to Year 11 and the 6th Form. She was also interviewed by two of our A Level science students Grace Legg and Magnus Hinves about her adventure into space. The full interview can be found on our YouTube and social media channels.

My thanks go to all science staff and students for all their hard work this term. They have certainly earned their Christmas Holidays this year! Well done to all and have a very merry and restful Christmas!



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The second part of the Autumn term has been full of activity and excitement in the RE department. For Year 7, 8 and 9 our units of study have been centred on an exploration of various aspects of 'identity' and 'tradition' as students have explored the origins and development of the Abrahamic faiths and their place in society today. Students have also been encouraged to reflect on their own spiritual and moral development and the various influences that act upon them.

During the first half term, Year 7 studied the story of St. Edward and the history and development of our school, particularly the values that underpinned its transformation into a joint church school. All Year 7 students enjoyed an RE lesson spent in our school chapel with Father James where he spoke about the main features of a Christian place of worship and reminded students that the school chaplaincy team there to support them if they ever need it. Year 7 students also got to explore the theme of 'Walking Together' on the Year 7 Retreat Day. Led by our chaplaincy team, students spent the day at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church reflecting on their first experiences of secondary school and the journey ahead of them.

Year 8 students began the year exploring the concept of 'Vocation'. They engaged brilliantly in a Q&A session with Father James about his own calling and the priesthood. Year 8 students have now moved on to learn about the key beliefs and practices within the Jewish tradition, with a particular emphasis being placed on the concept of 'covenant' and how the relationship between God and humans has developed over time.

Year 9 found the study of a range of both religious and secular ethical theories particularly engaging and have since been reflecting on how best to solve moral dilemmas in their own lives. They have now started an in-depth study of Islamic beliefs and practices.

Our Year 10 students have begun their GCSE studies by exploring key beliefs and practices

within Christianity and Judaism. We would like to thank Mr Farrow for his talk about the historical complexities of the Israel-Gaza conflict so that students are able to understand the events that have recently taken place in that region. We are looking forward to begin discussing 'Issues of Life and Death' after Christmas, asking questions ranging from 'Where do we come from?' to 'What happens when we die?',

Once again we have been privileged to benefit from visits from the PACE (Programme for Applied Christian Education) team in a variety of RE lessons. A particular highlight was a series of Year 11 lessons that debated the compatibility of Christianity and Humanism and featured a guest speaker from Humanists UK. Our Year 11 students are currently engaging wonderfully with our 'Issues of Good and Evil' unit, exploring the different aims of punishment and debating the death penalty.

In the Sixth Form, a very large class of Year 12 students have made an enthusiastic start to their study of A-Level RE and have already started to evaluate a number of high-level concepts. In Philosophy they are questioning the existence of a soul, in Ethics they are analysing the works of Immanuel Kant and in Theology they have been exploring Augustinian theories concerning human nature.



As the festive season approaches, it's time to reflect on what our students have accomplished this term in Geography and what lies ahead in the New Year. Here's a snapshot of what each year group has been working on and how you can support their learning during the holidays.

Year 7: From Ghana to UK Weather

Year 7 students have had a fantastic start to their Geography journey, recently completing a unit on Ghana as a developing country. They explored themes such as economic development, trade, and cultural diversity. Now, they are turning their attention to the UK's weather and climate, learning about patterns, seasons, and extreme weather events.

Over the holidays, you might discuss weather changes you observe or watch weather forecasts together to deepen their understanding of this new topic. It's a great way to make learning relatable and fun!

A stroll through the city's vibrant neighbourhoods could provide invaluable insights into the geographical topics they've been studying.

Year 11: Preparing for Fieldwork and the Future

Year 11 students have been focused on their mock exams, showing impressive dedication and resilience as they prepare for their GCSEs. We're proud of their hard work and determination.

Looking ahead, students will be embarking on exciting fieldwork in Boscombe and Swanage. This hands-on experience will provide them with the opportunity to apply classroom learning to real-world environments, exploring coastal processes and human interaction with landscapes. Please ensure students are prepared with appropriate clothing and enthusiasm for this invaluable experience!

Our Year 13 students have been diving deep into their Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) individual investigations. From urban regeneration to environmental sustainability, they're tackling fascinating topics that showcase their analytical skills and passion for Geography.

Extracurricular: Geography Club

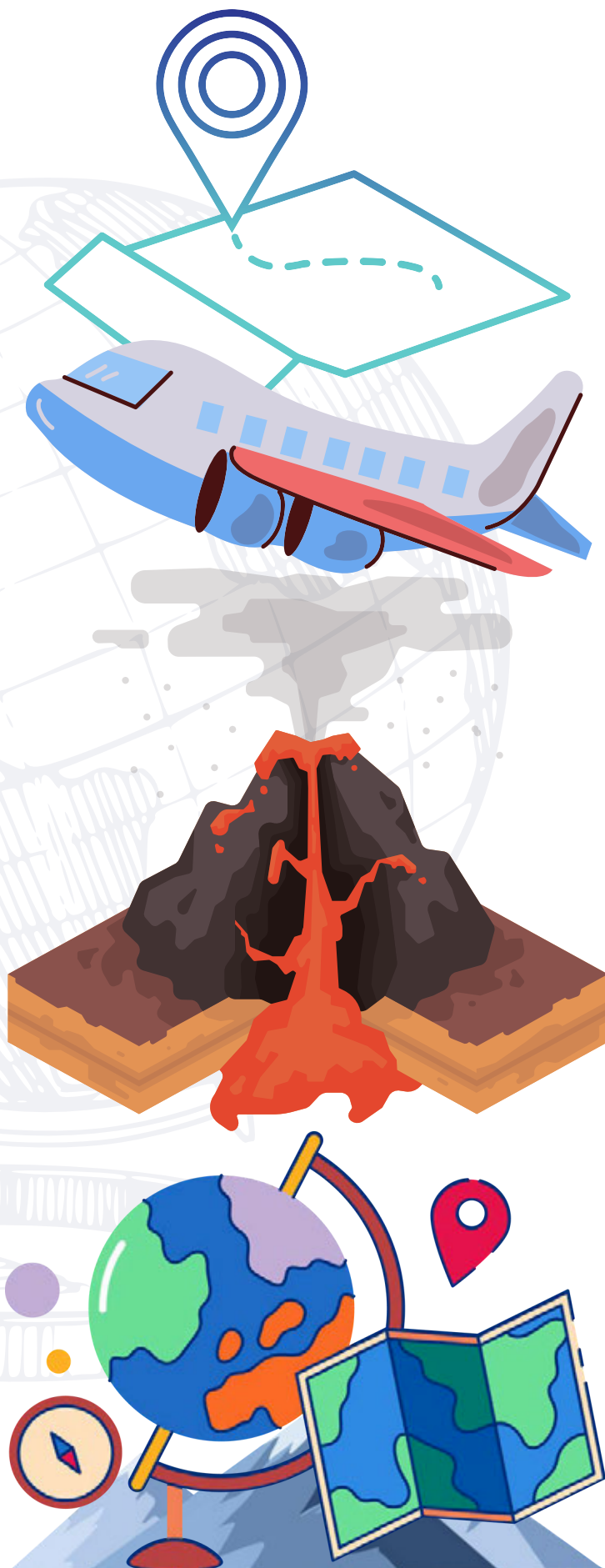

HISTORY

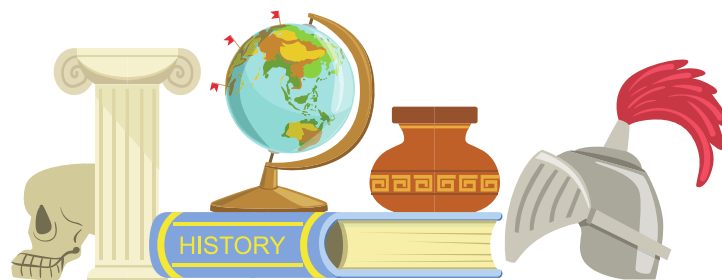
During the Autumn term, we have had the privilege of welcoming Laura Wright into the department. Miss Wright is teaching KS3, KS4, as well as teaching our A level politics students. We look forward to all of the new ideas she will bring to the department.

This term, we have been focusing on planning our extra-curricular provision, which will be launching at the end of the Autumn term. We have been planning our highly successful battlefields trip, which will be taking place during October 2025. Thirty five year 10 students will be travelling to Ypres and the Somme, to enrich their studies of history, as well as support their understanding of the lasting impacts of the Great War. This is, as ever, a moving trip where students really grasp the human impact of war.

We have also welcomed our 2026 cohorts of year 10 and year 12 students, including record breaking numbers of politics students! In year 10, students have been studying World War One, and have been focusing on the battles that shaped the conflict. Year 12 historians have been studying Russian history until 1891, examining the role of the Tsar and some of the challenges he faces as an autocrat. In Making of Modern Britain, students have been studying the 1950s and 1960s, which has sparked some fascinating discussions at home! During the Autumn term, we have been particularly proud of our year 11 and year 13 students who have sat mock papers. We have seen excellent progress in these, and we look forward to the continuation of their hard work.

Our KS3 students have continued to develop key skills; year 7 have completed an introduction unit, as well as a study of the Islamic Golden Age. Year 8 have been studying the Renaissance, and looking at the developments in art, science, technology and travel that shaped our world. Year 9 have shown immense maturity as they have tackled the challenging topics of the Transatlantic Slave Trade and the growth of Empire.

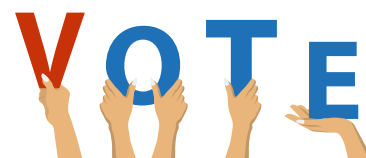
The next term is an exciting one; we look forward to watching our year 11 and 13 transition into the challenge of the examination period, as well as the restarting of the history revision sessions afterschool. We also have a number of exciting projects in the planning stages, which we know our students will find enriching and allow us to increase their understanding of both local, national and international history.



A Level Government & Politics

In Politics, this has been an incredibly exciting half term, with our year 12 and year 13 students closely following the US election. It was during a year 12 lesson that it was announced that Donald Trump had won the presidency, which was absolutely an experience that will stay in the memories of our students! In year 12, our new Politics students have been learning the principles of the UK constitution, and the process of devolution. With Miss Elms, students have been studying elections, where students have presented on the reasons for the 2024 Labour Party victory, compared to the reasons for electoral success in 1979, 1983, 1997 and 2019. The presentations were extremely thoughtful and illustrate the engagement the students have had with current British Politics. In year 13, students have been studying US elections (at times, studying the election live!) as well as the role of the US president.

We also look forward to launching our Parliament trip in 2025, which we hope will continue to build an understanding of how the Parliamentary system works in the UK!



Year 12 have settled very well into the demands of studying a new subject at A Level. Having grasped the key principles behind carrying out psychological investigations, students have designed and carried out a range of practical assignments, their first in the topic of Parapsychology, specifically investigating mind-reading ability using the Zener Test. Although many of the student's research findings indicate no significant differences in mind-reading ability between age and gender of participants, the effect of different types of music had a very surprising result with more participants being able to read minds when listening to heavy rock music compared to classical music!

Meanwhile, Year 13 have been enjoying their Biopsychology topic which has enabled students to feed their curiosity about the complex workings of the human brain. Students have been exploring the extent to which specific areas of the brain are responsible for specific functions and marvelling at case studies of individuals who live perfectly normal lives following damage or removal of areas of the brain, thanks to the concept of plasticity and functional recovery.

It's been a busy term as the large Y12 group have settled into their study of Sociology. They are a keen bunch and it was lovely to have a good number of volunteers for the Sixth Form Open Evening at the start of November. They sold the subject very well!

At the end of November, we welcomed Rachel Small JP to run her annual session with the Y13 students. She guided them through a fictional case study based on cases she has been involved in over the year. Students then used real sentencing guidelines to make a decision about how the offender should be treated. They engaged really well and asked lots of perceptive questions.

On 12th December we took the Year 13 students to Poole Magistrates court to find out more about how this important part of the Criminal Justice System works.

Throughout the morning, we were accompanied by two serving magistrates with over 20 years of experience between them. Their wisdom and experience helped us to understand the various procedures we experienced. Having planned to spend the morning in one court, we ended up having to be moved out as there was a closed session. In the court we ended up in we saw one brief case and the setting up of a trial. We were also lucky enough to be addressed directly by the legal advisor and the duty defence solicitor.

The change of plan meant we saw less than we hoped, but it nevertheless gave a valuable insight into the system and enriched students understanding of the Crime and Deviance module of the A Level.

In January students from across Y12 and 13 have the opportunity to take part in a Sociology Insights day at Bournemouth University. For those who are considering studying Sociology or Criminology at university it should be a really valuable day.

The autumn term kicked off with our annual celebration of European Day of Languages in September. We received a remarkable number of fantastic entries, showcasing dishes from Italy, Poland, France, and many other countries.



October saw the launch of the Language Lounge, where we explore languages and cultures every Friday lunchtime. It's a great opportunity for students to dive into different languages and broaden their cultural understanding in a fun and relaxed setting.

This year we also celebrate the 25th anniversary of our partnership with our exchange school, Gymnasium am Kaiserdom school in Speyer in Rheinland-Pfalz. In our MFL classrooms, our students have been making fantastic progress across various levels. Year 7 students have learned how to introduce themselves, their family, and friends in both French and German, and have been engaging in short conversations in their target languages. Year

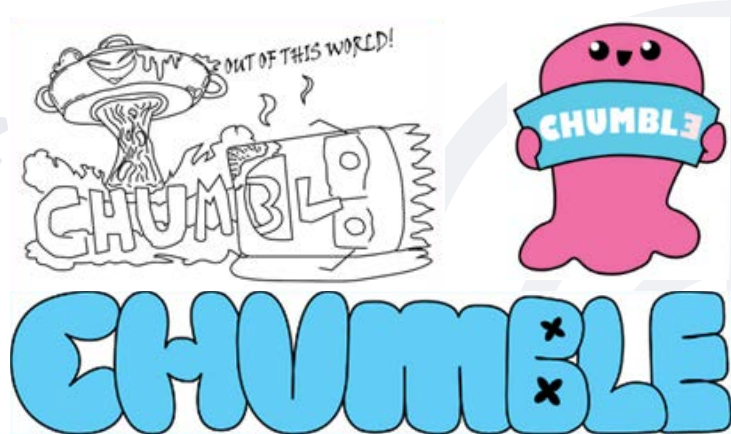

September saw the relaunch of the NCFE Graphic Design course at KS4. 20 Year 10 students enrolled on the course and started the term learning how to use the professional vector-based design and drawing program Adobe Illustrator. The students have then used their new skills to respond to a design brief which asked them to design a logo and magazine advertisement for a chewing gum brand called "Chumble". Next term the students will be working to a real-life brief to understand how to work with a client.



In October Year 12 Engineering and Product Design students visited Lush Manufacturing in Poole. The visit was part of a national manufacturing initiative where local companies opened their doors to showcase potential careers and jobs on offer within the manufacturing sector.

Students were able to observe how Lush products are made and participated in various activities across the company.



This term has also seen the Year 11 Food Preparation & Nutrition students complete their NEA 1 assignment. This element of their course examines their knowledge of food science and the

and the function and properties of ingredients. It makes up 15% of their GCSE grade. The exam board brief this year was to investigate the properties and functions of ingredients and raising agents in sweet or savoury scones. The students researched the ingredients and then planned and subsequently carried out three practical experiments. The students then analysed the results collected and drew conclusions as to how and why the samples reacted as they did. They then drew conclusion as to which would be the best ingredients to use in the future when baking. The students worked well in groups for the practical elements and then independently to write up their assignment.



As mentioned in last year's newsletter, Technology have produced an award to celebrate excellence in the subject. The award is named; the 'Robin Greenwood Award for Excellence', in honour of the man who made it. Robin has supported the department in his role as technician for many years and continues to work within the school as part of the site team. Looking ahead, we are thrilled to announce that St. Edward's will host its annual Christmas Concert on Thursday, 19th December at St. Mary's Church, Longfleet, Poole. This marks the first time we will perform at this stunning venue, and we cannot wait to showcase the talents of our musicians and vocalists. The evening will feature a wonderful mix of music, readings, and carols, promising to be a festive highlight for the school community.

In the curriculum, the Performing Arts team work hard to ignite a passion for the arts in students, and the tireless hours put into delivering an exciting curriculum is what helps build a real buzz within the department.

Key Stage 3 Drama

Year 7 students have been delving into the imaginative world of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. They explored characterisation techniques, analysing Roald Dahl's iconic characters before creating their own unique additions to the factory—a brilliant display of creativity and storytelling.

Year 8 have been discovering the theatrical traditions of melodrama and pantomime, exploring exaggerated characterisation, comedic timing, and audience interaction. These skills will form a strong

foundation for their devising unit in the new year.

Year 9 have tackled contemporary issues in Performing Arts Ethics, focusing on the role of technology, particularly AI and VR, in modern society. Through discussions and practical exploration, students have considered the impact of these advancements on creativity, authenticity, and the future of performance.

Key Stage 3 Music

Year 7 students have been developing their piano skills, learning to play melodies with both hands while focusing on proper technique, note-reading, and rhythm. They also explored basic chord structures, enabling them to perform simple accompaniments. These sessions laid a strong musical foundation while sparking enthusiasm for instrumental practice.

Year 8 have delved into the world of *Musical Theatre*. Through studying iconic works like *Les Misérables*, *The Lion King*, and *Hamilton*, they examined how music enhances storytelling and emotional expression.

Year 9 have embraced the vibrant rhythms of *Reggae*. By applying these methods to their performances, they have developed a deeper understanding of how to create compelling characters and innovative staging. This work supports both their devised and scripted performance assessments.

GCSE Music students have been preparing for

Component 1, deepening their understanding of various musical genres, from film music, Britpop, Reggae and Blues, honing their skills in analysing key features. Meanwhile, Component 2 has seen them working on mastering their individual instrumental or vocal skills, focusing on technical accuracy, expression, and confidence as performers. Their hard work is setting a solid foundation for their coursework and performance assessments.

We are looking forward to developing our Dance programme and provision within the curriculum and will hopefully be building on this so all students can access dance lessons throughout the school year and access specialised courses in both Key Stage 4 and 5.

We are proud of our students' enthusiasm and commitment to the arts. Whether it's performing on stage, exploring new skills, or simply enjoying the richness of live performance, the Performing Arts Department is buzzing with creativity and energy.

This term has been a celebration of talent, effort, and opportunity, and we look forward to building on this momentum in the new year.
