Continuity is so important. I have had various encounters with parents in recent months who have said 'I thought you'd already gone'. I wryly reflected that I must have got the handover right if no-one had noticed any change. To pass the headship of the school to Mr Barnett, who has served so faithfully as my deputy throughout the past nine years is such a source of pride and pleasure. I would like to thank him, the SLT and all of our staff for being just so fantastic to work with. I'm not always sure that people know quite what



goes into making a school like St Edward's work, but it is the relentless optimism and commitment of every single person, regardless of their role, together with a belief in the mission we are trying to advance, that makes our school what it is.

St Edward's School presents a unique educational offer. As a joint-Church school our horizons go far further than exams and universities. Our aim has always been to lay the foundations of a happy life well lived. It is for this reason, I believe, that St Edward's is the most oversubscribed secondary school in BCP. I am confident that the light of St Edward's School, and its special spirit, will burn brightly for many generations to come.

# **ENGLISH**



#### **Key Stage 3**

This term, Year 7 have been exploring the magical world of A Midsummer Night's Dream and what better setting to use than our own school woodland! Using this natural space performance area, students have brought key scenes to life outdoors, embracing the play's themes of mischief, magic and mistaken identity. Inspired by the magical themes of Shakespeare, students have also developed their creative writing skills by crafting characters and settings inspired by the play's fantastical elements. We also received exciting news from the national Poetry By Heart competition, both 7-A3 and 7-L2 were awarded Highly Commended! A huge congratulations to those classes- what a brilliant achievement in a national competition!



In Year 8, students have studied the playscript of Frankenstein as part of the 'Trapped' unit. Through reading and performing dramatic scenes, they have gained a deeper understanding of characterisation and the dramatic form. Alongside this, students have explored a powerful non-fiction anthology about animals in captivity which has prompted important ethical discussions. This unit encourages students to reflect critically and write purposefully, with student responses being thoughtful and impassioned. It's been a term of big ideas and even bigger questions- exactly what English should be about.

What would our world look like if things took a very different turn? That's the question Year 9 have been exploring through our *Dystopian Discoveries* unit. From climate catastrophe to tech takeovers, students have delved into the unsettling (and often eerily familiar!) landscapes of dystopian fiction. Students have studied a wide range of dystopian worlds and extracts, before going on to create their own dystopian narratives. The creativity, imagination and insight shown in their writing has been excellent with some outstanding examples of original storytelling, gripping plot twists, and richly imagined worlds- it's clear we have some future authors and storytellers sitting in our classrooms!

We're incredibly proud of the creativity, confidence and curiosity our students have shown this term. Thank you to all our parents and carers for your continued support- especially when your children come home talking about fairy feuds, mad scientists and dystopian regimes at the dinner table! A reminder that we have recommended reading linked to each KS3 unit. If students would like to explore their topics further, they are encouraged to speak to their English teacher or Mrs Lumber for book suggestions.

# **Key Stage 4**

We are so proud of all the hard work, dedication and perseverance shown by our Year 11 students before and during their exams. Students have shown remarkable endeavour in so many ways: in their lessons, reinforcing their knowledge and confidence of the texts and skills required; through their attendance of the additional revision

sessions prior to each exam where we've revised the specific requirements of each paper; in their revision, which many have discussed enthusiastically with teachers and has been evidenced in the significant numbers of students submitting additional practise answers to their teachers, seeking feedback and tips to improve in the run-up to that exam. We are very hopeful that, come results day, they will find themselves richly rewarded for their efforts.

In Year 10, we've moved onto our next core GCSE Literature text: Macbeth. Students have begun to build on the strong foundation students had acquired last term through the Macbeth theatre trip visit and the in-school performance to all members of the year group by students who had produced such a fantastic performance of the play through their workshop at Poole Lighthouse. Blending a 'cold-read' of the play with frequent review, compilation of useful revision resources and exam practice, we are confident that Year 10 will end this term with a thorough and comprehensive understanding of this, their last full-length Literature text. Looking ahead, they will begin Year 11 next year with the poetry anthology for Literature and a return to the key skills of the Language papers.



It's been a truly exciting term for oracy at St Edward's, with students sharing their voices and stepping into the spotlight- both here at school and on professional stages!

# Festival of Speech 2025

We were delighted to host our annual Festival of Speech in June. Thanks to the continued growth of our oracy programme, a record number of students took to the stage, delivering an impressive range of powerful and thought-provoking speeches. Topics explored included everything from communication ethics to whether

children should be allowed to vote; a true showcase of curiosity, critical thinking and courage.

The evening was expertly hosted by Lucy (Year 13), whose opening words beautifully captured the spirit of the event and the heart of our oracy mission:

"If I had to summarise public speaking in one word, I'd say home. Don't let me fool you... I'm not confident. I'm nervous to talk to one person, but standing in front of all of you, I feel safe. 


# SCIENCE

#### Year 7

Embracing the world of Musical Theatre, this term has maintained a focus on different musicals such as Annie, Oliver, Bugsy Malone and more. Students have been applying their understanding of performance and characterisation in a new style, considering how to deliver the same performance integrity through song and movement. Year 7 performed their extracts from their Musical Theatre unit at the Fringe Festival and we loved celebrating their success with audience members!

### Year 8

Students have been exploring more styles of theatre: Theatre in Education and Physical Theatre. Consolidating skills learned throughout the year, students have been devising their own scenes and performances in response to a given prompt or theme with a consideration for their intended audience, ensuring that performance is catered to their target audience. Moving on to Physical Theatre, students have then been challenged to continue establishing meaning in their performance but now without the use of dialogue, focusing on how their can use their movement to communicate their narrative.

#### Year 9

This term, students have engaged with a brandnew unit exploring Events Management. Through their selected pathway, Performer, Technician, or Organiser, students have been creating and developing their own concepts for an Arts Festival. Throughout this topic, students have considered the most effective methods of marketing, managing a small budget with big ambitions, and finalising the logistics of the events running through the day before presenting their projects, culminating in deciding a winning festival for each class. As their final unit of study (for some students) in Drama, we hope that the skills developed throughout the project will support them in their future endeavours.

#### Year 10

Following a successful set of results from their recent mock exams, as well as an enriching and enlightening week of work experience, Year 10 Drama GCSE students return to their Devising projects. Each piece explores different themes, from navigating mental health through challenging family dynamics; exploring the impact of seemingly insignificant choices on the greater narrative of our lives; to the ever-changing landscape of the school experience. We really enjoyed showcasing the highlights of these performances at the Fringe Festival and the students appreciated the support and feedback which they can use to improve their pieces.

# Year 7

This term, Year 7 students have been putting their music technology skills to the test with a unit on BandLab. Throughout this unit, they have learned key skills required to create a piece of music using a DAW (Digital Audio Workstation). These skills lay the foundation for Years 8 and 9, when students will be introduced to Cubase an extremely powerful and creative DAW. In addition, students have been learning the ukulele. They have

practiced the four most popular chords, explored a variety of strumming patterns, and perfected songs in small ensembles.

#### Year 8

This term has been all about Cubase and video game music. Students began by learning their way around Cubase through a series of tasks, which enabled them to create their own soundtracks for video clips from well-known games. This included composing and adding their own sound effects, background noises, and musical motifs.

#### Year 9

Year 9 students have been exploring the evolution of popular music, looking at genres from rock and roll and Beatlemania to Britpop and modern-day pop songs. They have then used their understanding of these genres to create and write their own original pop songs. This process included choosing chords, writing lyrics, and adding a variety of instruments. What an exciting way to conclude their KS3 music journey!

#### Year 10

Our Year 10 students have been working incredibly hard to meet all of their deadlines whether submitting Component 1 for BTEC Level 2 or completing the first draft of their free composition for GCSE alongside learning all about music for a variety of different ensembles. We are incredibly proud of their dedication, commitment, and contributions to the music department this year. They have certainly earned a well-deserved rest!













# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Summer term in RE has been packed with all sorts of activities and events!

Once again, the highlight of the summer has been the Year 7 trip to Salisbury Cathedral that we ran collaboratively with the Art and History departments. As well as receiving a tour of the cathedral, it was lovely to see students completing artwork on the floor of the cathedral and for students to experience the world-renowned 'Doom painting' in St Thomas' Church firsthand; the latter being explained with great expertise by our own Mr Henry and Miss Elms. Thank you to all of the students in Year 7 for the fantastic way that they represented our school and to all the staff that accompanied the trip and covered lessons back at school.





In the Summer term, Year 7, 8 and 9 classes in RE focus on the themes of Diversity and Justice. After finishing their study of "Who are the people of God?" (which focused on a range of Old Testament figures), Year 7 students moved on to explore the theme of diversity through an in-depth study of Hinduism which also featured some interesting discussions on the topic on animal rights. More recently, students have been completing series of lessons based on 'Social Justice Heroes'; considering what virtues are required to be such a person and how we might follow in their footsteps.

Year 8 have focused on the concept of 'Dukkha' through their study of Buddhism and have been considering the Buddha's response to what causes suffering and what the cure might be. Towards the end of term, they have been focusing on "Does all life have value?", looking at the distinction between the Sanctity and Quality of Life and applying these concepts to modern day issues such as Animal Rights and the Euthanasia Debate. Year 9 have completed their in-depth study of Sikhism, with an emphasis on the importance of equality and the oneness of God (Waheguru). Year 9 students have also recently benefitted from either a residential retreat at St Cassian's Retreat Centre or from a retreat that was run in school hours by the PACE team at a St Clement's Church: we would like to thank both the PACE team and St Clement's Church for their hard work and their hospitality to make that event possible.

Having completed their internal examinations, Year 10 students are now nearing the end of their first year of GCSE study. We are currently trialling the use of bespoke Learning Booklets for our current Year 10 unit of study (Issues of Relationships), initial student feedback is very positive. We would like to thank Miss Cooper as she has put a huge amount of time into developing these booklets for use in lessons. Year 11 have now completed all of their final GCSE examinations in RE; we would like to thank them for all their hard work in RE and wish them all the best for the future. We are delighted that a large number of

these students have already expressed their intention to study RE at A-Level!

Year 13 RE A-Level students have also completed their course and their final examinations; we would also like to thank them for their dedication to the subject and wish them well with their future endeavours.

We had planned for the Year 12 Personal Enquiry students to participate in a muti-faith panel called the 'Many Faiths Workshop'. This was highly popular last year, but unfortunately this event was postponed at short notice due to illness of some of the panel members. We are planning to run the event during the Autumn Term.

We are continuing to develop strong links between our RE curriculum and the Chaplaincy work within the school. In particular, we have been delighted to see participation in the CYMFED (Catholic Youth Ministry Federation) Faith In Action Award growing, with a group of students in Years 9 and 10 recently achieving the Silver Award following the conclusion of their art project that aimed to raise awareness of single use plastic. We would also like to thank Miss Perks for her assistance with the design and completion of the artwork.

# GEOGRAPHY

As we approach the end of the academic year, the Geography Department is pleased to share an overview of the engaging and enriching learning that has taken place this summer term. Across all key stages, students have been developing their geographical knowledge and enquiry skills through a wide range of stimulating topics, with real-world relevance and fieldwork connections.

## **Key Stage 3**

# Year 7 - The Dorset Coast

This term, Year 7 have been studying coastal processes and landforms, focusing on the Jurassic Coastline in Dorset. Students have explored the formation of features such as headlands, bays, arches, and stacks, and have examined the impact of coastal erosion and deposition. This topic not only enhances their understanding of physical geography but also encourages awareness of coastal management and sustainability—timely as we head into the summer holiday season, and hope that our young people will be able to converse knowledgeably and with passion about the processes and landforms that you encounter on your beach visits.

# Year 8 – Glacial Landscapes and Upland Areas

Year 8 have been learning about glacial processes and the dramatic landscapes shaped by ice. Through studies of the Swiss Alps and the Lake District, students have developed a deeper understanding of how glaciers have sculpted our valleys and mountain ranges, as well as the challenges and opportunities these environments present for human activity.

#### Year 9 - Tectonic Hazards

In Year 9, students have explored the powerful natural forces associated with tectonic activity. By studying earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, and plate boundaries, students have gained insight into hazard management, risk reduction strategies, and the social and economic impacts of tectonic events on communities around the world.

# **Key Stage 4**

# Year 10 - Coastal Landscapes and Fieldwork Preparation

Year 10 have been focusing on coastal environments, with particular attention to the Purbeck Coast. As part of their GCSE preparation, students have been introduced to key fieldwork techniques and enquiry methods. This work lays a strong foundation for their Year 11 fieldwork investigations, supporting both their academic progress and their understanding of how to apply geographical knowledge in the field.

## **Key Stage 5**

# Year 12 – Urban Regeneration in East London

Our A-Level students have enjoyed a valuable field experience in the East End of London, where they examined the processes and impacts of urban regeneration. The visit included studies of the Olympic Park and Stratford, providing real-life context for concepts such as gentrification, inequality, and sustainable urban development. This fieldwork has significantly enhanced their understanding of urban change and its implications for local communities.

We are proud of the enthusiasm and commitment shown by our students throughout the term and look forward to continuing to develop their geographical thinking in the next academic year. On behalf of the Geography Department, we wish all students and their families a restful and enjoyable summer.

I am pleased to announce the winners are Holly from Yr12 in third place with her photo of Greece, Lucy and Francesca in joint second place, both with photos of Amsterdam and in first place, Lavinia in Year 8, with her photo of Budapest. Congratulations to our winners, who were presented with a certificate and a small prize during the end-of-term celebration assembly. Thank you so much to all the students who took part this year. All entries are now on display in the MFL corridor for everyone to enjoy.









In Language Lounge, our Friday lunchtime club, we learnt a little Spanish and Portuguese. The highlight had to be celebrating the Eurovision Song Contest, learning about Basel in Switzerland, and of course having fun casting our own votes! We can't wait to re-launch the Language Lounge in September, where we look forward to seeing our regulars, as well as welcoming new members to our group. It's such a lovely opportunity for students passionate about languages to meet and learn outside of a formal classroom setting.

A highlight for our sixth form students recently has been the opportunity to take part in the Festival of Languages. The A level French students attended an online lecture hosted by the University of Liverpool and the A level German students attended an online lecture from the University of Lancaster. We really enjoyed being part of the Festival and appreciated the opportunity to get involved in this event.

#### **Progress in the MFL Classroom**

- Year 7 students have completed half a year each of French and German and have learnt to talk about themselves, their families, school and their hobbies in both languages.
- Year 8 French students have learnt about talents and role models this last term.
   Meanwhile Year 8 German students have learnt about going out and making plans with friends.
   All year 8 language students have completed the year with a cultural film study, where they have watched a target language film and completed character studies and summaries of

- the film. Students learning French watched the French film Le Petit Nicolas a comedy about a mischievous young boy whose idyllic life is thrown into chaos. Students learning German have enjoyed studying the film Fritzi Eine Wendewundergeschichte, set around the fall of the Berlin Wall, again with exercises to accompany the film.
- Year 9 students have completed the Key Stage 3 language courses now. German students have been learning about childhood and school this last term, whilst Year 9 French students have learnt about Normandy. Our Year 9 lessons have similarly had a cultural and historical focus to end the year, where we carried out a historical project and analysed a film in the foreign language, which proved hugely popular with our students. The German students studied Ballon, which tells the true story of two families who escaped East Germany in a hot air balloon before the unification of Germany. French students studied the classic French film Les Choristes, an emotional story about a teacher who transforms the lives of troubled boys in a strict boarding school by starting a choir. The students enjoyed their film study and the work that went alongside that.
- Year 10 language students have made good progress in their GCSE courses and have just finished the topic of festivals and celebrations.
- Year 12 students have also completed half of their course, are thriving in their literary study, analysing characters, themes, and the social and political context of their texts in both spoken and written French and German.
- Well done to both our Year 10 and Year 12 students for successfully completed their first year of study for their courses, completing mock exams and their first experience of a speaking exam. We are immensely proud of them all.

Finally, we hope you all have a lovely summer, and we look forward to welcoming our students back in September.

# **PSYCHOLOGY**

This term, Year 12 students have been starting the topic of Issues and Debates, which involves an indepth look at the big questions of Psychology such as to what extent is our behaviour due to nature or nurture; and how far are we responsible for our actions or is our behaviour pre-determined by biological, environmental or unconscious factors beyond our control. Students have also been developing their mathematical skills in Psychology with an introduction to statistical analysis which has enabled them to draw conclusions about the significance of research findings. We began looking at this with a simple experiment on mind power to see if a coin would land on tails more when we willed this to happen compared to when we didn't. Although there was an increase in the number of times the coin landed on tails in the mind power condition compared to the control, this difference was surprisingly found to not be statistically significant!

Finally, with the exam season drawing to a close, we would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Year 13 on their hard work and efforts preparing for the exams. With Psychology being one of the first external exams, we were proud to see how well they coped with their nerves and took it all in their stride.



# **TECHNOLOGY**

This term has seen many new and exciting projects across the department enabling students to develop their skills and understanding through interesting and challenging scenarios.

Year 10 Graphic Design students have been experimenting with a variety of techniques through several small design tasks. These have included designing a book cover with the main feature being lino printed and redesigning an album cover for their favourite band using digital collage.



In Resistant Materials Year 8 have been working with metals to make balancing toys. Students have learnt how to braze and have been enhancing their work with acrylic elements designed and cut on the laser cutter.



In Year 10 Resistant Materials, larger projects were implemented allowing students to build skills and develop knowledge across wood, metal and

plastics. This term the project was focused on wood and students made a small table out of a mixture of different timbers, working with hard, soft and manmade woods. Students used traditional had cut wood joints with decoration added through Computer Aided Design and the laser cutter.



Year 10 Food students have been seeing their knowledge of food science working in practice by making summer fruit trifle. The practical demonstrated the functional properties of cream when whisked, cornflour to thicken a sauce and eggs to make a foam. The finished results were impressive, especially as they made them on the hottest day of the year; it was a challenging practical session for all involved.

Year 12 Product Design and Engineering students have enhanced their understanding of the wider world of engineering and design by undertaking 2 visits this term. The first was to Bournemouth University where students visited the Festival of Design and Engineering which saw final year design and engineering students from the university present their final year projects. The visit gave the students an insight into what studying these subjects at university might look like.



# **TECHNOLOGY**

The second visit they undertook was to Eaton Mission Systems in Wimborne. The students were shown around the shop floor including their testing and firing ranges and were able to see firsthand their manufacturing processes. They also met with several engineers and designers to learn about their roles and find out about their careers and how they got to be doing the jobs they do now. Whilst there they also got chance to try airto-air refuelling on a flight simulator though none could beat our newest Technology Teacher Miss Gaynard for speed.

And finally, this term's Technology Greenwood Awards for excellence went to, Jacob M at KS5, Scarlett S at KS4 and Fayrouz A at KS3. Well done to all 3 students who have shown excellence in the subject throughout this term.





# **BUSINESS STUDIES**

This term Year 12 Business students have been improving their oracy skills through assessed presentations. The two tasks this term have been focused on applying Porter's Strategic Matrix and Ansoff's Matrix to multinational businesses such as IKEA.

Firstly, the students had to complete a formal presentation on whether IKEA should expand further in India or concentrate on their core markets in developed economies. Not only did the students have to produce an industry standard presentation and speak convincingly to their audience, but they had to add a touch of humour to the proceedings. This helped engage the audience and aided in making a complex topic palatable. Well done to our A Level Business students for some excellent presentations.

Secondly, they had to develop their literacy skills through the production of a display analysing a multinational company using Porter's Strategic Matrix. The display had to convince the viewer that they had presented a clear and coherent analysis of the generic strategy. Their work was thoughtful and balanced and offered prompted some excellent discussions.



# GCSE & A Level Art Exhibition as part of St Edward's Fringe

Our Year 11 and Year 13 art students worked incredibly hard to produce their Externally Set Assignment work which is the final component of the GCSE and A Level Art and Design courses.

A diverse range of imaginative and creative work has been produced and it was therefore wonderful to celebrate the student's achievements at the summer art show. The show was an opportunity for the GCSE and A Level students to show their work to their family and friends and for staff to celebrate the amazing art outcomes with the class of 2025. The A level students spend a great deal of time putting their own work up and we would also like to thank the site team and the art department for their hard work preparing the exhibition rooms and screens, the work looked stunning.

In a second art room alongside the exhibition visitors to the Fringe were invited to participate in art activities, such as becoming a living moving art work by letting our students paint you with face and body paint or contributing to a large scale joint artwork responding to the Lubaina Himid piece 'Lost Threads', that all our Year 7 students saw first hand at Salisbury Cathedral.

#### The Josh Taylor Memorial Prize



An annual highlight of the art exhibition is the announcement of the winner of The Josh Taylor Memorial Prize. The Prize was set up to commemorate the life of Josh Taylor, a talented artist and former A Level student. The prize celebrates both Josh's artistic talent and the talent of students at the end of their A level course. Congratulations go to Gabriella M who is this year's winner of the Josh Taylor Memorial Prize.

#### **Visit to AUB Summer Shows**

Students will have the opportunity to view a range of work in Textiles, Model making, Architecture, Fine art and illustration.
